Community Service Director Award-Honoring Those Who Facilitate and Inspire Service Learning to Create Campus and Community Connections

This is the eighth year for the ICC Community Service Director Award. It is given annually to recognize staff at Indiana Campus Compact member campuses who are exemplars of building campus and community connections while supporting student learning and development through community engagement.

ESSAY GUIDELINES

- provide a reflective piece on the transforming impact of the campus and community connection for faculty, staff, students, and the community;
- describe any innovative programming that you have created and/or implemented which has greatly affected the campus and the community and discuss the outcomes; and
- provide evidence of the your own commitment to offering your professional service in addressing community issues.

Brian Douglas Hiltunen Faculty Award for the Outstanding Contribution to the Scholarship of Engagement

The Brian Douglas Hiltunen Award is presented annually to recognize faculty at Indiana Campus Compact member campuses who are exemplars of the scholarship of engagement.

In his essay, *Creating the New American College*, the late Ernest Boyer challenged higher education to recommit to service. He expressed concern about a “growing feeling in this country that higher education is a private benefit, not a public good.” To address this concern, Indiana Campus Compact developed the Faculty Fellows and the Scholarship of Engagement programs to support faculty in their endeavors to recommit to service and thereby become connected to the community.

ESSAY GUIDELINES

- How are service-learning, community-based research and/or other community engaged pedagogies incorporated into your teaching?
- What is the impact of the practice of the scholarship of engagement for you as a teacher and a scholar?

You may choose to address the following through your CV and/or through your essay:

- Evidence of your commitment to professional service in addressing community issues; and
- Information about any published work related to the scholarship of engagement and the impact of such published work.

Outstanding Community Partner Award

Indiana Campus Compact (ICC) is pleased to announce the fourth annual Outstanding Community Partner Award. This award is given annually to recognize an outstanding community partner organization and its staff and volunteers for their partnership with an ICC member institution to educate and empower students and provide a positive impact in their communities.

NOMINATION PROCESS

1. Any faculty, staff, or student from an ICC member institution may nominate a community partner organization for the Outstanding Community Partner Award.
 - A community partner organization, for the purposes of this award, is defined as a nonprofit agency, school, government organization, or other community based organization serving the broader community.
 - A community partner organization is not a student organization or department of the university/college.
2. The nomination packet should include the attached nomination cover sheet, a letter of nomination, and two additional letters of support. The letter of nomination must demonstrate the following:
 - A sustainable partnership between the campus and the community agency which involves students, faculty, and staff from multiple units on campus.
 - The campus and community agency working together toward mutually defined goals in order to best meet community identified needs.
 - An understanding that community partners play an important role as co-educators in the development of students as civic leaders.

Richard J. Wood Student Community Commitment Award

The Richard J. Wood Award was established to recognize students at Indiana Campus Compact member campuses who have demonstrated an outstanding commitment to community engagement.

ESSAY GUIDELINES

- Describe the direct community service, service learning, and community engagement activities you have participated in during your collegiate experience. (If earlier experiences have impacted these more recent experiences, please feel free to share them.)
- Share the impact this service activity has had on the community, your campus, and your life.
- Reflect upon how your involvement as a community engaged leader has affected your personal, professional, and academic development and how it will influence your future civic leadership and community engagement.
